#### **Meeting notes**

1.	Welcome and introductions	Cllr Richards
	Cllr Richards welcomed everyone to the meeting and introductions were made	
2.	Review actions from previous meeting	Margo Turner
	Actions from previous meeting were briefly reviewed.	
	The following actions from the previous meeting have been resolved:	
	<ul> <li>Council to provide update on timescales for first phase of contraflows</li> </ul>	

4.	School travel plans and School Streets	
	Lindi talking about the school travel planning process, including STARS and accreditations levels, details on the support and programmes we provide to schools and the Councils role in events and promotions. She provided information on the total number of schools in the borough and how many were engaged in the travel planning programme. She talked about plans for upcoming Bike Week and Clean Air Day, and the work that took place recently around the Big Pedal. She detailed the plans for 19/20, including Bikelt and School Streets. Tim asked about engineering measures, and Lindi relayed that requested engineering improvements had to be included within the school travel plans. For School Streets we initially considered 10-15 schools and we are currently working with the most feasible and interested schools, an invitation to express interest in a School Street has now been sent to all schools. James asked why more schools are not engaged in the STARS	
	system. Lindi responded that a lack of resources was the most common reason that schools didn't participate, travel also was not a priority for some schools. Lindi mentioned that she is trying to engage more with PTAs to try and encourage interested parents to act as travel plan leads.	
	Tim asked about how we can get more School Streets more quickly. Lindi said that we are focusing on trying to implement a small number of high-quality examples before extending the programme to additional schools.	
	Tim asked about cycle parking provision at schools. Lindi replied that we keep a record of provision at schools, but that it is for the school to update on an annual basis.	
	Tim suggested that more information should be shared on the website and on social media, including listing participating schools, collision data and data collected through STARS, as well as information on support available from the Council for schools and information about the bike markets.

5.	Progress on the Active Travel Strategy & Strategic Cycle Network	Margo Turner
	Margo provided a quick overview and asked if there was any additional feedback on the draft Active Travel Strategy that was distributed previously.	
	Cllr Saunders queried the council policy around EV charge points and where they are located, with a need to look at more chargers being located off pavements.	
	Cllr Saunders suggested the strategy include consideration of the negative impact dropped kerbs across driveways can have on pedestrians, with an aim for better designs so that they are flat across the pavement, with the sloped portion within the property.	
	Cllr Saunders mentioned that there are some ongoing issues with the design of the inset parking bays in Hampton Hill, with vehicles over-running the bays onto the pavement and putting pedestrians at risk. She suggested the focus should be on ensuring this type of design is not introduced elsewhere in the borough.	
	The targets were briefly discussed, with requests from Jenine to reconsider the level of ambition.	
	Cllr Mansfield asked for the vehicle hierarchy to differentiate between non-polluting and standard delivery and servicing vehicles. There was also wider discussion about the need for the strategy to include more aspirations around supporting cleaner delivery vehicles.	
	Cllr Saunders suggested we should look at widening the criteria for considering the introduction of low-traffic neighbourhoods, that the council should be more pro-active in identifying locations and we should consider adding a target around their introduction in the strategy.	
	There was a discussion about timescales for the strategy to go to the Transport and Air Quality Service Committee and when it would go out to public consultation.

It was noted that additional discussions were needed around promoting walking and cycling in light of the Hammersmith Bridge closure
