## Schedule of Responses Explanatory Notes

All responses have been provided to the Inspector, in a schedule format and in full (confidentially as the full responses contain personal details). Each response has been entered and given a MM Representation number. Duplicates where identified have been removed/collated into one response (e.g. comment (a) and comment (b)). Some households may have submitted more than one response, from different individuals, or on behalf of other groups etc. and are recorded as such.

The schedule shows where any personal information within responses relating to contact details, particularly full address data, has been removed stating e.g. *[personal details removed for data protection]*.

Some hand written names could not be read. There are approximately 150 responses recorded in the schedule shown as "Name Unclear" which were mainly postal responses with signatures or writing that could not be distinguished, however these have been cross checked against the postal details (although removed from the published schedule for confidentiality) to ensure there is no duplication. It would be a crying shame if this site was developed, especially for the luxury apartments proposed. Teddington / Twickenham doesn't need more housing, there are 4 major building sites in the area that are already providing enough new housing. And there will be more kids in need of a big green space to run around. We are convinced, that the protection of endangered species: bats who need the full area WITHOUT night- time light pollution in its centre, the protection of the remaining mature trees and open grass-land, that would soak up rainwater and provide for hedgehogs, are much more important, than more flats, or another GP's office that can be installed in any of the above mentioned new developments. This space is a potential home for many local sports organisations - organisations that can and do offer provision for our pupils. The loss of such a space would negatively impact our pupils through the loss of local sports club provision. It would be a travesty if after 100 years as a sports fields, this facility was lost. Sports fields are continually being built on to accommodate school and university buildings, or being sold off to speculative developers like Quantum, and as a result the lack of playing fields is now acute. Should St Mary's proceed to build the proposed new student blocks on their campus then no doubt the fields at Lockside will be less able to accommodate local teams and the problem will become more acute. The tide needs to be turned or the opportunity to play amateur sport within Richmond Borough will be lost to future generations. Aside from the issue of the erosion of the playing field space within the borough - - Udney Park is a central green space that must be protected from predatory Plans for luxury apartments for which there is no local need because there are already 300 luxury flats under construction within half a mile of the Park on brown-field sites. Thamesians RFC have a particular interest in this as we are local club regularly facing the immediate problems of providing the pitches and facilities to match what we are achieving on the pitch. At present we play our home games at both Marble Hill and Waldegrave School. Our training is spread over three further venues at Hampton Sports Centre, Whitton Fields and St Mary's College. None of the playing or training facilities are located proximate to our clubhouse which is the cricket pavilion on Twickenham Green. At the pavilion we have taken a lead in refurbishing the building – including making substantial financial input over the years. Although we have now been sub-tenants to the cricket club since 1993 in truth we have out grown the space that this building provides. This year the club fielded 3 men's teams, a ladies team (that won their league) and a Vets team. The men's sides play on Saturdays; the ladies

This is our personal example of how special and precious this land is to our community and how any reduction in this very special playing fields also makes them special to our community. Lord Beaverbrook, who was a wartime cabinet minister instrumental in two World Wars, specifically gifting the

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	playing fields to the community for amateur sport. The playing fields are a War Memorial, opened in 1922 by the WW1 Home Secretary, and are clearly special, worthy of the additional protection afforded by LGS from predatory developers.
	Finally, independent ecology reports have identified that the playing fields are home to eight protected species. This clearly demonstrates how special the playing fields are in terms of the richness of wildlife which has made Udney Park Playing Fields their home.
	One final point, I am very concerned about the local doctors' surgery e-mailing their 13,000 patients encouraging them not to support the designation of LGS, instead support it remaining as OOLTI, without a clear outline of the implications of this dilution of protection. The Park Road Surgery email doesn't even mention Quantum though pleads for opposition to LGS to support their joint Planning Application, surely a misuse of power in the doctor/patient relationship and personal patient data? What is more, local people are being given the view that patient healthcare in the Teddington community will be compromised unless there is support for the development on UPPF. This is untrue fear-mongering, and could result in a distorted picture of how the community feels about the loss of this special green space.

97	Pauline and Stephen <b>Cox</b>	I am writing in support of retaining the current designation of Udney Park as OOLTI (Other Open Land of Townscape Importance). We have lived in the Teddington area for 49 years now and frequently pass the Udney Park playing fields. We have rarely and infrequently seen any use of the playing fields for sport by the university, or other users. The prospect of community use of this area for sport as well as a GP surgery and sheltered accommodation is a very welcome and helpful development. Our GP surgery has 13,000 patients and Teddington has an ageing population with very little in the way of sheltered accommodation. The development of Udney Park for these and other benefits would be very positive. We do not consider that Udney Park fits the definition of Local Green Space (LGS) as it is demonstrably NOT special to a local community as there has been no community use of it as a recreational space (note the high fences to maintain its present exclusivity). It is not significantly beautiful, nor of historic significance in an area which boasts Bushy Park and Hampton Court Palace and Park. It has no special tranquillity or rich wildlife as is found close by in the Wilderness Woodland in Bushy Park and extensively along the River Thames. We therefore strongly support retaining its present designation as an OOLTI and its future development to the benefit of the local community.

I also enjoy the natural beauty and tranquility of the area, which is currently quiet and peaceful compared with busy roads nearby (e.g. Twickenham Road). The Udney Park Playing Fields add character, peace and beauty to this part of Teddington. Quantum's proposed development would destroy that peace and tranquility and diminish much of the local character. If Quantum develops on that land, the area will become much busier. The sports clubs they belonged to regularly struggled to find local sports fields to use. We often had to drive quite a distance to weekly training. My youngest son has
		benefitted from having activities in Udney Park within walking distance, and I would like to see this continue and extend to more opportunities. There are still several Teddington-based sports clubs which do not have a permanent home in Teddington. It is a wonderful park in which to relax. When my son was attending his training sessions, the park was big

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		enough to find a quiet spot to have a moment to myself and enjoy nature, a bit of respite from my busy life.
		The park is a vital part of the the local ecology network. Udney Park was given to the community for the express purpose of fostering amateur sport. The successful ICC Women's World Cup, the upcoming ICC Men's Cricket World Cup and the ECB All Star Cricket junior programme mean cricket participation across all ages and for boys and girls is growing, however losing playing pitch space will severely limit the social benefits arising from community cricket. We are having this conversation with central government too through the Sceretary of State at the DCMS. The London Playing Fields Foundation calculates that London has already lost 40% of its cricket pitches in the last 20 years. There is much policy to protect playing fields and the ECB via Sport England already fights to protect cricket where it is threatened, yet some developers still persist in driving their own plainly self serving commercial agendas by converting green space into building plots. I am therefore very familiar with the dispute relating to the Udney Park Playing Fields (UPPF) and with the arguments put forward by both sides. The history of the UPPF - the charitable gift to the community, the restrictive covenant restricting their use to amateur sport, and their use for 100 years as playing fields - is now well known. Sadly, also now well-known and well-documented are the many disgraceful and mendacious manoeuverings by Quantum in their opportunistic and predatory attempt to obtain planning permission to build luxury apartments on this much-loved and much-needed local green space, massively reducing the area of land on which sport could be played. Throughout my 33 years living in Udney Park Road the UPPF have always been extensively used by local schools and clubs for a wide variety of sports. Playing fields in this area are in very short supply, and the local need for these sports facilities is now greater than ever. Several local sports clubs have no permanent home. The developer (Quantum's) plans seems to have something for everyone and as I understand this land is privately owned, I think it is an opportunity not to be missed. I work for a Pharmacy in Teddington and we have very close links to the Drs surgery in Park Road who are at bursting point. I am aware they have been looking for alternative premises for years but neither the CCG or Council has come forward with a site. This has a detrimental effect on both the Drs and the patients. It seems unbelievable in such a lucrative area that the surgery at Park Road is not even DDA compliant. The local plan states that this site should be designated as Local Green Space. Why? It makes total sense to leave its status as OOLTI which provides adequate protection from inappropriate development yet offers an opportunity for the public to benefit in the future from this space. I like the sound of this land being accessible to everyone, the creation of new and improved sporting facilities, a landscape path with a pond and a community orchard. Whilst I am against over-development, these proposals seem to provide a well-balanced approach that would benefit all of Teddington. A Local Green Space designation could make these plans very hard to go ahead. Therefore I believe it makes sense to retain the current OOLTI designation for Udney Playing.
359	Sarah <b>Clark</b>	I have been aware of the proposals submitted for this land from the landowners. Quantum and I am in favour for a new GP surgery to bought Teddington- this is an asset that we are very much in need of and we have been for a long time. If this land is to become Local Green Space, instead of its current designation of OOLTI then it would become incredibly difficult for a new health centre to be brought to Teddington and it would be of great loss to our community. It states in the local plan under policy LP28 that proposals for "new social and community infrastructure will be supported where it provides an identified need". The waiting list to join the current surgery at Park Road is very long, and we must surely be open to change when its so needed? For the above reason I object to the land being designated as Local Green Space.
360	Jamie Foggon	I do not believe the status for the private land at Udney Park should be changed and I believe it should stay as OOLTI. I fail to see how this land benefits the local community given its current status but retaining the OOLTI status could open up opportunities for a limited amount of development, thereby securing the future of the site and helping to address some of the needs of the local Borough including a provision of extra care housing and a new GP surgery. The OOLTI status will protect the site from being over developed whilst

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		enabling the general public and community from finally being able to access this land. LRBuT do not seem to have justified how this land should be LGS and I therefore find the plan unsound.
361	Renuka <b>Rai</b>	I do not agree with the Council's proposals to designate Udney Park land Local Green Space. My reason for this is it will result in preventing public access to this private land. I work with the pharmacy in Park Road and see first-hand how stretched for space the local doctor's surgery in Park Road is. Demand far outweighs capacity and they urgently need more space and new facilities for their patients. Quantum's plans will ensure Teddington will receive a much-needed doctors' surgery along with much needed extra care homes and sports facilities for the WHOLE community to enjoy rather than a select few as is the current case. The land is surrounded by solid fencing which on the whole prevents anyone from seeing into the site, it looks run down with broken fence panels, unpruned hedges and the clubhouse is always being vandalised by local youths. I cannot see how this land has special qualities in the state it is in now and the state it has been in for years. The Council must focus on the fact that this is private land and think about how making this Local Green space will benefit the local community. Making it LGS will not benefit the community at all, rather hinder any potential for making this space a real asset to the local community.

Designating the land at Udney park as LGS could potentially close all doors to the possibility of a sustainable location for this surgery that caters for over 13,000 patients I the area. This seems more important to me as a resident, rather than allowing a basic field to become the equivalent of green belt.
368	Lucie <b>Maxwell</b>	I am writing regarding the Local Plan and the new consultation on Udney Park Playing Fields. Firstly, I would like to state that I support the Planning Inspector's original decision to maintain the site as OOLTI. AS a local resident, I am very familiar with this site and it only seems to be used sporadically and when Imperial College owned the site it was expensive for small clubs to hire. The clubhouse is very rundown, there is solid fencing bordering the site with scrappy hedges around the perimeter, so I fail to understand how this site is of value to the local community which it serves or holds particular significance. In relation to NPPF criteria for LGS, it can hardly be classed as "beautiful", there is limited recreational value in its current state and the only reason it is tranquil is because no one can access it. 387	Paul <b>Sinton-Hewitt CBE</b>	My name is Paul Sinton-Hewitt, I live in Strawberry Hill and am the founder of the Worldwide <b>parkrun</b> movement which started its life in 2004 in one of our local green spaces, Bushy Park, Teddington. I strongly Object to the removal of Local Green Space at Udney Park Playing Fields. Starting from our first event in Bushy Park, Teddington we are now represented in 20 countries with over 1,800 weekly events, managed by volunteers. We make use of green spaces to bring together local communities around the basic theme of getting active in a social event. In the UK parkrun hold over 700 events every week, by definition located in local parks, from which I have developed expertise on the topic of keeping community outdoor recreation space protected and available. I know from this experience how special amateur sport can be to a community's health and well-being. Our movement has been incredibly successful in assisting previously inactive people to become active, changing their lifestyles. In the Teddington catchment area, we have over 70,000 local people registered and managed by 3,000 volunteers. The thing that I am most proud of is the way in which our communities have developed in association with the creation and development of each and every parkrun event and Teddington is a great example of this. I have followed closely the local case of Udney Park in Teddington, it is clear that in an area with a

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		<ul> <li>population interested in community sport there is a deficit of space for outdoor recreation, especially pitch sports. parkrun is keen to expand Junior parkrun, where children run independently. While we do not currently offer a parkrun in Udney Park, we have discussed the appropriateness of a Junior parkrun which allows children to run over a distance of 2km. Udney Park is located in the centre of an urban area, hundreds of children could walk or cycle there and hence Udney Park would be a perfect location for a junior parkrun, as the Park has a secure boundary of around 1km. These amendments restricted the making of town and village green (TVG) applications where "trigger events" applied and also

The result of the amendments was to make it more difficult for open space to be protected and so the government introduced the LGS designation as an alternative process.</li> <li>The society responded to the consultation on the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) in 2018 raising concerns about the wording and process for designating land as LGS. We welcomed the revised NPPF (July 2018) with the removal of restrictive wording which the society had argued was preventing applications being made.</li> <li>The society has produced a guidance tool for protecting open space, which includes guidance on designating land as LGS, and frequently responds to members who are attempting to make an LGS designation. We keep under review local and neighbourhood plans to monitor the use of the LGS designation.</li> <li>The society objects to the removal of Udney Park Playing Fields from the Local Plan and its designation as LGS. Introduction</b>         SWLEN is a local environmental and community development charity, which also acts as the Secretariat of the Richmond Biodiversity Partnership. The Richmond Biodiversity Action Plan contains a Bat Species Action Plan as bats are a locally important species (as well as nationally). This aims to reverse the current population declines of bats in London Borough of Richmond. The Richmond Biodiversity Action Plan also has species action plans promoting the preservation and improvement of the habitat of various birds, including the song thrush, house sparrow and swift and other species including hedgehogs, stag beetles and pollinators.     </li> </ul>

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		2. Significance for wildlife SWLEN notes that Quantum undertook a bat survey prior to the planning application, although this was some time ago and it needs to be repeated to get accurate up to date data. The bat survey stated that the bat activity survey recorded at least 8 different species of bats within the site boundaries or high above, the vast majority of these were common and soprano pipistrelle, although noctule, serotine, brown long-eared, leislers, myotis species and nathusius pipistrelle were recorded.' The survey indicated that there was a bat roost in the pavilion but was undertaken too late in the year to ascertain its status. SWLEN also notes LB Richmond's case to the Planning Inspector which states that the developer's own report "shows 8 different species of bats, including myotis species. This is a significant number of species considering that the Barnes Wetland Centre has 7 regular species and is a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) and Site of Metropolitan Importance for Nature Conservation (SMINC) for its habitat mosaic and species assemblage. The application site could be designated as a SMINC for its bat interest, size and connectivity. The bats were seen within 2 hours of sunset which does mean that roosts are nearby or the bats are foraging." LB Richmond's case goes on to state "This site is unique in the local environment, due to a number of factors, its sheer size, the lack of public disturbance and its position as a stepping stone and corridor contribution between the River Thames, St Marys University and Bushy Park, in an area with a network of connecting back gardens and also houses which due to their age and design have many bat roosting features." Therefore, although current information about bat activity on the site is inadequate, it is clear that Udney Park Playing Fields is an important site for bats in the Teddington area and is part of a corridor of activity from the Thames to larger sites such as Bushy Park. SWLEN therefore believes that th

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		3. Other criteria SWLEN also objects to the withdrawal of LGS designation because Udney Park Playing Fields appears to meet all of the other criteria for designation in para 100, including being "in reasonably close proximity to the community it serves" (it is in the centre of Teddington) and "demonstrably special to a local community because of its beauty, historic significance, recreational value (including as a playing field) and tranquillity". It is local in character and not an extensive tract of land. The playing fields are a quiet oasis in a built up area, surrounded by mature trees, and have great historic significance having been given by Lord Beaverbrook for sports use in memory of young men killed in World War One.
453	Name unclear	I believe that the current OOLTI designation provides sufficient protection against potential unsuitable over- development and should therefore not be granted LGS status. I understand that there have been proposals put forward by Quantum to provide a new arena for the riding schools in their plans- amongst housing, a GP surgery and sports facilities. However, there are significant limitations to the operation of sports clubs in the Royal Parks. The local facilities available for sport are limited and community open space and facilities ae inadequate given the population. Whilst we have no direct interest in the sports ground, it is clear that the facilities Udney Park were never effectively available to the general public and the facilities available for hire by clubs and schools were so expensive that they were hardly ever used by sports clubs, the challenging economics of supporting intensive community use on grass pitches is a problem we know well. In contrast, we believe that the range of community based open space activities proposed in the current planning application is much more suited to the local community, since it will provide floodlit multi-use and artificial playing surfaces that better meet the needs of local clubs. We understand that an application of LGS status requires an area to be demonstrably special to a local community and hold a particular local significance because of its beauty, historic significance, recreational value (including as a playing field), tranquility or richness of its wildlife. Technical arguments against this redesignation have been made in previous consultation processes and it is relevant that the conclusion of the Planning Inspector was that OOLTI provided for affordable housing, healthcare facilities and sustainable sports grounds in the Borough appears motivated by something other than rational argument. Turning to the specific criteria, the playing fields at Udney Park Road can't be deemed demonstrably spec

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		There is no evidence of demonstrable beauty- the fields are all grass and the playing surface is gradually decaying through lack of investment. There is poorly maintained multi use games area and the boundaries and fencing are in state of disrepair. The level of historic importance is hard to substantiate – despite its gift to St Mary's Hospital many years ago, nothing of significance has occurred to the site over the past 50-100 years. If all land donated by a wealthy benefactor were suddenly to become LGS, the impact on development across the country would be significant. There has been very little recreational value for the local community since the policy and prices of Imperial College inhibited local clubs from using the land to any great extent. This is not, and never has been, open park land owned by the council. The land in question has been closed, private land not for community use for many, many years and of considerably lower recreational value than that envisaged in the proposed development. I have served as Local Councillor for 39 years for the Ward that includes Udney Park Playing Fields. I serve as the current Chairman of the London Assembly, a Member of the Environment Committee and as a Member of the Regeneration Committee. I therefore have a broad Capital-wide knowledge of the London Plan, the London Environment Strategy and the need to meet the SHLAA housing requirements in London through regeneration whilst protecting vital Green Space. I review all of the Local Plans produced by London Boroughs in the course of my work. Hence, I am well qualified to comment on how special Udney Park is to the local community, the general standard for Local Green Space across London and the increasing degree to which community sport is a vital component to the long-term quality of life in London. <b>Udney Park is Special to the local community</b> The current owner of the site, a developer from Bournemouth called Quantum, were fully aware how valuable Udney Park was to the community before they bought the site as there were 2 Planning Briefs, arising from a meeting between Imperial College and the Council Planning Department. The brief was clear the Udney Park is a protected playing field and the Council's 2015 Playing Pitch Strategy defined Udney Park as a "strategic site of Borough-wide importance", especially given the shortfall of supply of playing pitches versus current and future community demand. Given the threat to development on Udney Park, and the frustration in the community that Imperial had sold to a developer despite three competing community bidders and the presence of an ACV application (which

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		<ul> <li>was granted soon after the sale to Quantum completed) it was entirely appropriate that the community groups responded to a threatening new owner by seeking to protect Udney Park further.</li> <li>Local Green Space is a "nominated by the community" protection, where extra protection would be helpful to prevent unnecessary development. The Teddington Society, the largest and oldest community group, and the Friends of Udney Park applied for LGS. The Council gave this application due consideration, listened to counter arguments from Quantum and their development partners and decided to adopt LGS in the draft Local Plan. The former Conservative Council Leader Lord True said in December 2016 at the Cabinet Meeting when adopting Local Green Space: "we have listened to Quantum and the community and decided that Udney Park is Local Green Space: "we have listened to Quantum, they knew they were buying green space in a Borough that protects its green space".</li> <li>Through the 2-year Local Plan and Teddington Village Plan consultation the protection of Udney Park from any built development was the issue that was consistently raised by the greatest number of my constituents. Furthermore, after LGS was adopted, the draft Local Plan went through further consultation and LGS remained to the end of the Public Exam process. Crucially, people that argued for removing LGS were mostly as a result of lobbying by Quantum to the organisations that are prepared to partner with them to gain access to a much reduced space and patients of a GP surgery seeking to expand on new premises on Udney Park, no-one argued that Udney Park was not needed to serve the community, just that some were prepared to tolerate a trade-off with a developer. Many more local clubs and schools refuse to partner with Quantum and be used as window-dressing for building on a Park.</li> <li>Given the extraordinary profit margins available from building on calling Udney Park - "the former private ground" and claiming it has "no recreational value". Quantu</li></ul>

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		In July 2015 I raised the issue of Udney Park at Mayors Question Time: "Given your concerns about the loss of playing fields in London, do you share my concerns about the potential sale and development of the 13-acre Teddington Sports Ground owned by Imperial College, in breach of covenants designed to ensure that the Ground be used for sport in perpetuity, and will you do all you can to ensure that these valued playing fields are protected?" The Mayor replied:

The London Plan policy is absolutely clear that you cannot have a loss of open space unless you have equivalent or better provision. No application has been made for this site. I note that it was donated to Saint Mary's Medical School by Lord Beaverbrook in 1937 specifically for use as rugby union pitches and later taken over by Imperial College London. It would be an absolute scandal and an outrage if that land was lost for that purpose"</li> <li>In 2018 the GLA Planning Office reviewed the current Planning Application that seeks to build on Udney Park as part of the upcoming Public Inquiry and said: "It is acknowledged that the proposal would enhance sporting facilities. However, this could be achieved through the redevelopment of the site in a manner that accords with the relevant London Plan. The proposed development on protected playing fields breaks the National Planning Policy and the London Plan and is not supported"</li> <li>Unfortunately, such clear conclusions from the Council and the GLA did not dissuade the developer from "taking a chance" by appealing against the Council and the GLA did not dissuade the GLA claiming the proposed accommodation is C2, which removes the need for ClL.</li> <li>Hence, the developer, by persisting with a project that significantly breaches many Policies is causing the public sector, including Sport England, to spend precious resources protecting a playing field. 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		demonstrating the very high level of importance the GLA ascribes to playing fields. In December 2018 the GLA "Sport for all of us" Strategy for Sport and Physical Activity makes it clear how important community sport is to the people of London, and in the Teddington community sport plays a huge part in local life, with thriving clubs and waiting lists for junior members. The new GLA Sport Strategy says: "Improving the health and wellbeing of our city is one of a top priority, and sport is a great tool for achieving this. Regular exercise can help to tackle obesity, improve mental health and raise self-esteem, so it's essential that we invest in programmes that expand access to sport for all Londoners. Sport can also bring much wider social benefits that are sometimes overlooked – from improving employability and addressing loneliness and isolation, to helping divert young people away from crime. Time and again, we see the amazing impact sport can have in our communities and how it can transform the lives of young Londoners – giving them structure, purpose and a sense of direction. One thing that stands out above everything else, it's the remarkable power sport possesses to bring people together and break down barriers. That's why fostering social integration and building stronger communities are key goal of the Mayoral sports strategy. Our city lives and breathes sport and at a time when our society too often seems divided, we must use sport to strengthen the bonds between our communities and help make London the most socially integrated and active city in the world" Whilst the most obvious way that Udney Park serves the community is as a Playing Field, it also has significant environmental value. Based on the independently commissioned Richmond Council Playing Pitch Strategy, documents which have to follow a statutory method, there is a clear shortfall in pitch capacity in the Borough of Richmond. It is clear and obvious that Udney Park Playing Field, as a 12.8 acre Playing Field in an urban area, has substantial recreational value to the community, hence the designation as a "strategic site" in the Playing Pitch Strategy. In my view, read in the context of the policy as a whole, the word "serves" operates in this way, and I see no justification for reading it more widely to create a requirement that the open space "serves" the local community in a free-standing manner beyond the question of being "demonstrably special" and holding "a particular local significance". This interpretation is in my view, clearly more consistent with the purpose of the policy than the claimant's construction. Furthermore, as Mr Phillpot on behalf of the defendant pointed out, it also reflects the approach of the PPG which reflects the interrelationship and overlap of the bullet points of paragraph 77 when addressing the question of proximity and observing: "the proximity of the local green space to the community it serves will depend on local circumstances, including why the green area is seen as special, but it must be reasonably close." That latest document takes into account the fact that Quantum have denied access to cricket use and that tenure is unsecure. Clearly, that is part of the speculative developer's attempt to downgrade the significance of these playing fields.</li> <li>In the 2015 document the Imperial College site is regarded as "Strategic", defined as a site essential to meeting the demand for outdoor recreation in the Borough, and it is recognised as available for hire by local sports teams and schools for fixtures and training, for other uses such as children holiday camps and for community events though with space capacity. 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		I understand that there is some doubt as to the validity in declaring the Udney Park Playing Fields as a Local Green Space. These grounds were awarded to Robert Fullerton Udney under the Teddington Enclosure Act of 1801. There were 11 acres coming down from his house fronting the High Street, contained by Udney Park Road to the east, Kingston Lane to the west and the Southfield, later to become Cromwell Road, to the south. The land changed hands several times until 1906 when it was acquired by the Belgravia Land Co Ltd. Strangely no attempt seems to have been made to develop the land for the next two decades. In the early 1920s the Old Merchant Taylors' Sports Club (the old boys association of the Merchant Taylors' School founded 1561) raised a Memorial Fund, partly to provide for the education of sons of the fallen OMTs in the First World War and partly to establish a War Memorial. The Teddington site was selected and purchased. After some levelling and turfing, The Old Merchant Taylors' war Memorial Sports Ground opened for business in October 1922. This situation continued until when the school moved from the City of London to Hertfordshire in 1937 with the Sports Club moving shortly afterwards, leaving the Teddington site vacant. After undergoing some serious surgery and receiving some very good treatment at St Mary's Hospital, Paddington, Lord Beaverbrook asked the hospital if he could do anything for them. Dr Charles Moran, personal physician to Winston Churchill, told Beaverbrook that the hospital needed a Medical School and Lord Beaverbrook duly obliged with a donation of £63,000. Dr Moran considered it necessary to have a good rugby ground to be able to attract the best students from Oxbridge and after the Medical School was built, Lord Beaverbrook donated the sports ground at Teddington to the hospital in perpetuity for the purpose of amateur sports, the chief one of these being amateur rugby union. Udney Park became the sports field for the hospital and very many years of high level rugby were played

The ground at Udney Park Road does not fit into this description, so therefore is not eligible for this designation. If it is designated as Local Green Space, then I fear that the old sports ground will be retained for private use and the wider community will be unable to enjoy some excellent facilities. I understand Quantum has plans to provide a variety of sports facilities which will far enhance the facilities that we have currently in Teddington on the sports ground. If this land was developed, then the potential for modern multi-use facilities would meet the needs of all the local clubs and associations far better than its current state. The land in its current form is basic; with sound planning and open access far more people could access high quality facilities. Therefore, I conclude it would fail to meet the needs of our community and consequently in my opinion your Local Plan will be unsound if the council allows this site to become Local Green Space.
926	Simon Davis on behalf of Teddington RFC Ltd	I am writing on behalf of Teddington Rugby Football Club, a large, community focused rugby club that operates in Bushy Park, Teddington, regarding the above main modification. The change of designation from OOLTI to LGS is something that I and the Board of Teddington RFC Ltd strongly oppose. Although Richmond has huge amounts of greenspace relative to other London Boroughs, the facilities available for sport are limited as various Council reviews make clear. We have struggled for many years to find suitable spaces for rugby training and that can support bad weather activity. Furthermore, the Royal Parks have prohibited us from using floodlights for the past decade and impose even stricter controls on activities in Bushy Park. For the last 20 years we have looked at the unused Udney Park Road site with envy, but the hire costs imposed by Imperial College made hiring of the grounds completely uneconomic and the clubhouse facility is far from the child welfare and safeguarding standards required today. Our understanding is that to meet the criteria for Local Green Space an area has to be demonstrably special to a local community and hold a particular local significance, for example, because of its beauty, historic significance, recreational value (including as a playing field), tranquility or richness of its wildlife. There are various technical arguments against this redesignation as has been made plain in the previous consultation exercise and would point to the conclusion of the Planning Insector that the OOLTI provides adequate from inappropriate development. Specifically, given the historic designation, the proposed redesignation at a time when there is such a need for affordable housing, healthcare facilities and sustainable sports grounds

Reading the criteria, the playing fields at Udney Park Road do not seem to be demonstrably special to the local community, since they have been closed private grounds for many years, used occasionally by clubs or schools who are now playing elsewhere. There is no evidence of demonstrable beauty – it's a patch of grass that is gradually decaying through lack of investment, has a scruffy MUGA pitch, unkempt boundaries etc. Re historic importance seems a thin argument based on the lack of anything meaningful occurring on the site over the past 50 -100 years. And if every building or piece of land donated by a wealthy benefactor over 100 years ago were suddenly to become LGS, the planning system would collapse. With regard to recreational value, there has been historiacally very little value for the local community since, as I noted above, the policy and prices of Imperial College were an inhibitor to local clubs using the land. Even Newland House School who used the facilities have gone elsewhere. A piece of land in central Teddington clearly could not be called tranquill given the local traffic and aircraft noise. To residents who live next to it, it is a simple grass field with poor boundary shrubbery and a rundown clubhouse. Since it was purchased by Quantum, various community groups, including 3 <sup>rd</sup> Teddington Scout Group, have been able to use the current facilities on a temporary basis. Should the Council decide that it wants to reverse the decision made by the Planning Inspector (to keep it as OOLTI), then this would reduce the potential for it to become a community focused space as proposed by Quantum – and many clubs and groups like ours would be negatively impacted. To residents who live next to it, it is a simple grass field with poor boundary shrubbery and a rundown clubhouse. There is no local need for more luxury flats in this area. There are over 200 flats under construction less than ½ a mile away at Teddington Lock. I understand that these remain largely unsold. Quantum say that they are providing "much needed extra care housing for older people". Yet these apartments will be available to purchase by anyone over the age of 55. That is not housing for older people, that is a huge amount of profit for building over a sports field. Similarly, the need for a larger GP surgery could be addressed without building on valuable green space. The surrounding roads can barely cope with the current traffic/parking generated by the High Street and school runs. A 13000 patient GP surgery with only 16 parking spaces will cause gridlock.

Richmond has large amounts of green space relative to other London Boroughs due to the Royal Parks and council provision. However, there are significant limitations to the operation of sports activities in the Royal Parks and elsewhere in the Borough. The local facilities available for sport are limited and community open space and facilities are inadequate given the population. Whilst we have no direct interest in the sports ground, the Imperial College facilities at Udney Park Road were too expensive for us to hire for camps and specialist training activity. The absence of an artificial pitch was a major drawback, especially in the winter. As a result, the site was uneconomic for Imperial College to operate, leading to its sale. In contrast, we believe that the range of community based open space activities proposed in the current planning application is much more suited to the local coll cubs and coaching organisations such as ours and the Schools we serve. We understand that an application of LGS status requires an area to be demonstrably special to a local community and hold a particular local significance because of its beauty, historic significance, recreational value (including as a playing field), tranquillity or richness of its wildlife. Technical arguments against this re-designation have been made in previous consultation processes and it is relevant that the conclusion of the Planning Inspector was that OOLTI provided an adequate level of protection from inappropriate development. Given the existing OOLTI designation, applied consistently over many years, the proposed re-designation, when there is a significant need for affordable housing, healthcare facilities and sustainable, multi-use sports grounds in the Borough appears strange to us. Turming to the various criteria, the playing fields at Udney Park Road can't be deemed demonstrably special to the local community, since they hav
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		College inhibited local clubs and sports organisations/schools from using the land to any great extent. This is not, and never has been, open park land owned by the council. The land has been closed, private land, essentially unused by the community use for many years and of considerably lower recreational value or utility than that envisaged in the proposed development. Regarding tranquillity, nowhere in central Teddington is tranquil given local traffic and aircraft noise. It is only 'quiet' because historically, other than one school's term time use, no one else could afford to regularly use the sports ground. In terms of wildlife, whilst we are not involved directly, we understand that surveys undertaken to date do not appear to demonstrate any richness within the boundaries of the site – all it is are grass pitches and poor-quality hedges. The trees on the boundary appear to be poor quality in-fill of negligible value. In summary, we believe that a Local Green Space designation is unjustified, and that it could stand in the way of developing a facility that the community appears to need and could benefit from. Turning private, largely unused land into facilities of real value appears a better outcome for the Borough than designating it LGS and having the site deteriorate over years until some other solution is found for this land in the heart of Teddington. As a consequence, Lions Sports Academy and I do not agree with the Local Plan policy to change the designation of the land at Udney Park Road from ODLTI to Local Green Space.
1618	Matthew <b>Battle</b> (Newland House School)	Newland House School, a junior preparatory school in Teddington with over 450 pupils, leased Udney Park as its primary location for sport for over 30 years up-to the unfortunate sale by Imperial College to a developer in 2015. We played rugby, netball, rounders, cricket and football 6 days per week during winter and summer months, when the cricket pitches were prepared by Richmond CC for their use and Newland House played most afternoons and Saturday mornings. The school also used the Pavilion for changing rooms and function rooms for hosting parents which is in need of modernising though has character and potential. Imperial College also made the pitches and Pavilion available for rent on an ad-hoc basis to other local clubs and schools, and independently ran summer camps which were attended by many children from the school. My children attended Newland House for 10 years or so and I have been a Governor with responsibility for estates for 6 years, so I have personal knowledge of the community use I describe. Sport is an essential part of local community life in Teddington and there is a major shortage of pitch space to meet the demand

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		from schools and clubs and during this 'sale period' for Udney Park , Newland House School has now relocated its sport to an different location in the Borough.
		As a school we are keen to maintain sporting facilities in the borough and therefore supportive of any proposal which preserves Local Green Space, such as Udney Park Playing Fields.

It has had no

		We strongly object to the removal of LGS status for UPPF.
		The criteria for granting LGS status to an area is set out in Paragraph 100, National Planning Policy Framework. It reads:
		'100. The Local Green Space designation should only be used where the Green Space is
		(a) in reasonably close proximity to the community it serves;
		(b) demonstrably special to a local community and holds a particular local significance, for example, because of its beauty, historic significance, recreational value (including as a playing field), tranquility or richness of its wildlife; and
		(c) local in character and is not an extensive tract of land.'
		Looking at the framework it is clear that all three conditions (a), (b) and (c) must be met. Condition (b) is a general condition 'demonstrably special to a local community' followed by a number of possible examples through which the general condition can be shown to be met. It is our view that only one of the examples
		needs to apply for LGS status to be appropriate. However, we consider that all the examples are satisfied in any event.
		Dealing first with (c), it is our view that UPPF, at 12.7 acres and situated in the heart of Teddington, are

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	With regard to recreational value, there has been very little value for the local community, since, as I noted above, the policies of and prices charged by Imperial College were a major disincentive to local clubs and societies from using the land or clubhouse. Additionally, the clubhouse or pavilion is extremely limited in terms of its capacity and application as a community facility. It needs extensive modernisation to meet current standards and is of little value in and of itself. There is no evidence of demonstrable beauty – it's a large area of grass that is gradually decaying through lack of investment, has a scruffy MUGA pitch, unkempt boundaries etc. There is no redeeming merit to any of the facilities or monuments of significance. A piece of land in central Teddington clearly could not be called tranquil given school children drop off, local traffic and aircraft noise. The proposed designation was subsequently removed from the replacement Local Plan following LBRuT's consultation on Main Modifications to incorporate recommendations made by the Inspector into the Plan.</li> <li>Following the Main Modifications publication, Mr Jopling, a member of the Friends of Udney Park Playing Fields (FUPPF) filed a statutory review claim, pursuant to Section 113 of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004, in the High Court to challenge the adoption by LBRuT of this revised Local Plan on 3 July 2018. Mr Justice Dove rejected this submission: <ul> <li>"I can see no justification for having, in effect, a separate and free standing requirement that the land "serves" the local community, other than by being "demonstrably special" and holding "a particular significance" for the local community in the manner required by the second bullet point. In my view, read in the context of the policy as a whole, the word "serves" operates in this way, and I see no justification for reading it more widely to create a requirement that the open space "serves" the local community in a free standing manner beyond the question of being "demonstrably special" and holding "a particular local significance". Richmond upon Thames LBC</i> (2019) EWHC 190 (Admin)) (attached at tab 1), the High Court determined that the previous consultation process on the proposed Main Modification in this case had been "manifestly unfair" and "in particular towards those interested in <i>supporting the designation</i>" (see para 59 of the Judgment attached at tab 1). 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		<ul> <li>Is it demonstrated that the UPPF is special to the local community and does it hold a particular local significance?</li> <li>24. The short answer to this question is a resounding 'yes' for the following reasons:</li> <li>25. National policy provides a number of examples of how specialness and local significance might be demonstrated. The NPPF itself (at para 77 of NPPF 2012) cites as examples "historic significance", "recreational value (including as a playing field)" and "richness of wildlife". Further, the NPPG (at ID 37- 013-20140306) specifically refers to the presence of a war memorial as indicating local significance.</li> <li>26. Self-evidently, these are only examples and a green space does not have to demonstrate qualities from all (or any) of the examples cited in national policy. It can be sufficient if a green space fits within just one of the examples cited (or is of particular significance for some other reason).</li> <li>27. Sports England consulted the England &amp; Wales Cricket Board as part of its response the Middlesex County Board Participation Officer confirms that Richmond Cricket Club played adult cricket at UPPF every weekend and most evenings from the start of the 2006 season until the end of 2015 and that other sports users of UPPF included:</li> <li>Teddington CC (for regular, junior cricket)</li> <li>Newland House School (who also used the Non-Turf Pitch on-site to run two games at once).</li> <li>A further adult, non-league club who used to play matches every other weekend, using the area in the south east corner of the site that had been cultivated into a full size cricket pitch, who also used the pavilion on Saturdays for the changing rooms, showers &amp; toilets, tea and socialising in the bar afterwards.</li> <li>Many visiting teams short of space at their home ground (see tab 6)</li> <li>34. The above documents provided by Sport England and England and Wales Cricket Board constitute independent evidence of the recent past use and recreational value of the site to the local community.</li> <li>35. In a further consultation on the Planning Application submitted on 18 May 2018 (see tab 7)</li></ul>

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		<ul> <li>Priority) site. It is acknowledged that the applicant will provide new facilities for sport on the site (i.e enabling development) but this is not sufficient to overcome the quantitative loss of playing field from the site. The site is also an Asset of Community Value."</li> <li>36. The Friends and the Trust recognise that Quantum's planning appeal and the objections to it are part of a different process that is not before this Inspector. However, the above Sport England representations are plainly of relevance to the LGS designation that is before this Inspector. This is because they provide objective evidence of the community use and value of the site for recreational purposes and, by emphasising and relying on the "loss" of playing field from the site, the Sport England representations are objective recognition of the value of the existing playing field provision offered by UPPF (this evidence from Sport England was not available when the original LGS was made, nor was it available to the previous Inspector).</li> <li>37. Further objective evidence (that was not seen by the original Inspector) of the community use and value of the site for recreational purposes is provided by the Sports Imperial website screen shot from 2007 (attached at tab 8). This shows how UPPF and its facilities was available and openly advertised for community sports use, a point denied frequently in communications from Quantum and partners and in their submission to the Local Plan Public Examination, where Quantum's submission stated UPPF had "no recreation value" (see tab 13, section 2.3). It also details the partnership between the site to a local community club.</li> <li>38. The email (at tab 9) from the Operations Manager of the previous owner (Sports Imperial, a division of Imperial College London) demonstrates that UPPF continued to be available for community sports use up to at least November 2014. The email lists many local community clubs using the facilities such as Teddington Netball Club, Sheen Vets Football Club</li></ul>

		<ul> <li>40. As the original Inspector acknowledged: "it is clear that a large section of the community supports the designation of the land as LGS". However, to the extent that this is not universal, nor does it need to be to meet the threshold for LGS, it is important to recognise what has motivated the submissions to the contrary and it is crucial to note those motivations are most definitely NOT based on an argument that the land is NOT special to the community. Prior to the current Main Modification Consultation Quantum and their development partner, Teddington Community Sports Ground CIC, have invested in a lobbying campaign in support of their planning application and against the Local Plan LGS designation to seek to enable the success of that planning application. (evidence of this campaign is at tab 10), which shows a block email that was sent to local residents in January 2017 during the original Local Plan consultation, which expressly threatened a closure of UPPF if club members failed to submit Objections against LGS. However, the CIC partner communications either failed to mention Quantum at all or caused confusion by introducing a new name for Quantum. According to the anecdotal feedback passed to the Friends, of particular concern is that Quantum Teddington LLP, the joint owner of Udney Park, seems now to be representing itself as "Affordable Housing &amp; Healthcare". Although "Affordable Housing and Healthcare Group Ltd" is itself an "officer" of Quantum Teddington LLP, the use of the name appears to be deliberately misleading as the Quantum Planning Application expressly states that the scheme due for appeal at Public Inquiry in June 2019 contains no Affordable Housing. (see tab 11 for examples of the misleading material circulated by CIC members during this consultation).</li> <li>The concerns about Quantum's campaign during this Consultation precipitated unsolicited feedback to the Friends regarding the lobbying of patients of Park Road Surgery. Quantum and their partner Park Road Surgery, as they did in the Planning Application consultation, have again used private data (the Park Road Surgery patient list) and presence in the waiting room to generate support for removing LGS status despite complaints to NHS England and the Information Commissioner after similar behaviour during the Planning Application consultation.</li> <li>There is further anecdotal evidence that Quantum have deployed door-to-door researchers who state on the doorstep that are "working for a charity" to seek "votes" to remove LGS by posing variations of the question: "do you support plans for more affordable housing" to which the answer, absent of any fuller context, is tautologically yes. These researchers have been reported as far away as Ham, where local knowledge of Udney Par</li></ul>

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		<ul> <li>supporting the planning application will "ensure continued and enhanced community use of this marvellous open space in the centre of Teddington," backed up by claims that UPPF is not sustainable without Quantum, (a point easily disproved by the demand for UPPF from other clubs, availability of grants and other successful Playing Fields at other ends of the Borough). The "stick" is also repeated often, the attached documents (in tab 11) refer to the risk that LGS could "greatly restrict or even prevent, community use", thereby acknowledging the value of the community use that currently exists, and, more bluntly, that if Local Green Space is retained then "Quantum has informed us that the lease will be terminated and all community use of the site will stop."</li> <li>45. In conclusion on the issue of lobbying by the owner and their partners to remove LGS, it can be seen that, far from detracting from the contention that UPPF is demonstrably special to the local community or of particular significance, the Quantum/CIC campaign relies on the value of the site to the community for sport in order to seek to persuade members of CIC clubs to support their campaign to object to the LGS designation were confirming that UPPF was needed for community sport (and is therefore "of particular value" or "special" to everyone that "voted" to remove LGS), but that they were willing to accept a reduction in space if Quantum were successful with their Planning Application, in return for implied priority access to that reduced playing gaze after any development.</li> <li>46.
