Agenda Item One: Update from Councillors

Headline Topic: Ward Achievements		
Councillor	Achievements	
Cllr Frost	 Teddington Lock – funding for refurbishment secured, but wating for next financial year to start Fencing being dismantled on Teddington Lock Island Police surveying lock area Grass verges grown for bio-diversity, but wet weather has resulted in rapid growth. Some verges have become too high and residents cannot see clearly when coming out of their driveways onto the road Emergency double yellow line temporarily on Ham Gate Avenue when the gates were closed to the Park. car parking charges in Richmond Park may also create a parking problem on the Avenue. 	
Cllr Frieze	 Consultation on Ham Gate Avenue a letter was sent to all residents on Church Road to Latchmere Avenue in relating to parking issues. Church Road to Upper Ham Road has had smooth tarmac path laid, as there had been issues with pedestrians waling in the road as the previous path was difficult to negotiate. Church Road to Ham Farm Road has also been re-laid. 	

- Ham Polo Club applying for new equestrian track, keeping a check on the planning application. They
 are getting rid of the previous track as made up of plastics, but the Environmental Department want to
 ensure correct disposal of the plastics.
- Electrical charging points have been requested and the possibility of paving over driveways to allow for charging cars from home. There have been issues with allowing for a drop curb for access as many of the Ham drives are not sufficiently wide to allow for a drop kerb. You can go online to request charging points for your road and they are allocated according to demand levels.
- Ham Close regeneration is progressing with a recent visit to Rectory Park in Northolt as an example of good practice in new social builds. On the 19th/20th November there is a further consultation at St Andrew's Church.

Agenda item two: development of High Streets/shopping parades and the Local Plan

High Street Rejuvenation

Paul Clement:

- The development of High Streets has had its ups and downs, but current changes are unique due to the Covid 19 pandemic.
- The pandemic has had a devastating impact on business and sped up the evolution of the High St.
- In the last 18 months there has been an opening up of the local neighbourhood and reconnection with the values of local community.
- People have been travelling less and appreciating their local services.
- People's lifestyles have changed with hybrid working and thereby spending more time in the local area moving away for out-of-town retail options.
- The Homogeneous High Street is breaking down.
- Points of difference have become more important appreciating independents and living/working closer to their local offer.
- The Council's part is to provide leadership and a plan of action for business, but they cannot solve all the problems.

The Council Partnership Conference in May 2021 came away with 5 key themes for the development of the High St:

- 1. People wanted town centres to be a destination point
- 2. People wanted walkable/pedestrianised, green spaces in their High Streets.
- 3. People wanted a more balanced usage in town centres including civic uses
- 4. The local authority needs to have a creative approach to town planning and repurposing spaces

	5. Need for digital offer on the High St – embracing mobile revolution

Headline Topic	Attract more food/drink/restaurants to the local area
CIIr Frieze	There is a need to do more, but has not been discussed locally
Clir Frost	Ham and Petersham, Richmond Riverside recognised need for more mental health facilities for young people. Potential at grey Court to offer Off the Record counselling services and at Ham Youth Centre. Need for young people to get more involved in open spaces and conservation activities.
Cllr Frieze	Need to stop using cars and thereby reducing air pollution, but the Borough still has the highest ownership of cars in London. There is an increase in cycling, but often club cycling which has seen some abusive behaviour and clashes of road users with the public realm areas. BMX track needs developing, and provision of basketball court would be good. The Beaufort Road football pitch needs upgrading.
Cllr Richards	Changes are needed due to the decarbonisation global programme, preference to public transport and active travel. Need for reduction of car ownership through the younger generation leading the change.
Headline Topic	Teddington voted best place to live in London
Question 2	Simon Kavanagh: What can we learn from Teddington which has been voted the best place to live in London?
Response	Clir Frost : Teddington does have a wide array of independent shops including clothes shops and has a large stretch of shopping areas, but it is also the most expensive place to buy property. Ham was originally an affordable area, but now young people are being priced out of the area. There is a need for more social housing in the area. Chair : But has there been improvement due to the gentrification?
Headline Topic	Lack of Toilets
Question 3	Lack of public toilets in the Ham and Petersham area
	Cllr. Frieze: The Royal Parks are due to reopen the public toilets at Ham Gate with pressure applied by the local Councillors and MP. The New Inn is part of the Community Toilet Scheme but building a new public toilet provision is very unlikely. Other
Response	businesses have joined the Community Toilet Scheme such as Costa, Studio 123 and L'Amandine Café.
	electric car charging points
Response	Cllr.Richards: third party contractors build charging points and are less inclined to build in Ham
	Michael Walker (Resident): Currently can only charge electric car at home, but not on the High St which is off-putting for electric car ownership Clir Frost: At the Council Meeting last Tuesday there was a discussion of making charging points in existing lampposts, but this was problematic in Ham due to the location of lampposts/driveways etc. Why are so many cars needed per household?
