In this issue

The main focus of this newsletter will be:

Richmond Youth Offending Team now offers voluntary support for children and young people who are at risk of becoming involved in criminal or anti-social behaviour. Parents can also choose to receive support or guidance from the team, and can refer their young people via a referral form allocated on our new website. This innovative approach allows families to self-refer to our prevention team and address emerging concerns of offending behaviour, based on the following considerations.

- Is the young person frequently getting into trouble at school?
- Has the young person ever been excluded from school?
- Have relationship problems affected the parent relationship with their young person?
- Do they live in an area where there is a high crime rate?
- Do they suspect their young person is becoming involved in petty crime?
- Do they live in an area where there are concerns about the availability of drugs and alcohol to young people?
- Are they becoming unhappy with the type of young people their young person is mixing with?

If they can answer 'yes' to one or more of these questions, then families can self refer via the YOT website to access voluntary help.



Who can the team work with?

The Youth Offending Team focuses on prevention can work with:

- Children and young people aged 10-17 years
- Children and young people who are involved in anti-social behaviour and/or at risk of offending or re-offending
- Children and young people who are willing to participate in the programme, under a voluntary contract

Types of intervention

These sessions will be one-off sessions within the safer neighborhood wards. They will be focused on:

- substance misuse intervention
- actions and consequences
- peer associations
- restorative justice approaches
- neighborhood conferences
- parenting sessions

The conclusion of these sessions will explore transitional support and sign post to appropriate services within the borough such as targeted youth support, the Youth Service and the third party sector.

It is envisaged that referrals can be taken from November with the first rolled out in January.

New website

We are in the process of developing and up dating our website to make it more user-friendly. It will be more interactive, highlighting resources and programmes within the team, taster video clips of Eyes of a Criminal - a restorative approaches DVD, and community referral pathways to our prevention service. This is still in development with a plan to launch the new web page in November 2012. Please keep an eye out within the next news letter.
